Quilt Committee summary:

With the 2024 Sale in the books the quilt committee was pleased with how most of the quilts sold during the sale. Our top three items were Hip to be Square selling at \$3,200, Falling Stars and Jungle Beauty selling for \$1,750 each. We had an additional 7 quilts sell for \$1,000. We appreciate all of the hard work and talent that our quilters have provided to this sale and look forward to what they have to offer the sale in 2025.

As a committee the group goes through and determines the "best of the best" to be sold in the sale. We average around 200 donations of quilts and wall hangings each year. Due to our limited number of items in the sale we look at all aspects of our donations to determine what will go into the sale and what we deem should be sold elsewhere. With Rachel stating she no longer plans to run Artisans Market; the quilt committee would like the board's direction on where we should be sending items that we feel are not up to par for the auction. Will someone be taking over Artisan's Market and if so, could the board provide contact information so that a member of the Quilt Committee can connect with that person to determine how they would like donations to get to them. We would like to know the Boards directions in this area before our committee meets on Thursday, April 10, 2025, as this is the date that we will sort through all of our donations to determine what will be in the sale. We will also be picturing all donations that weekend.

OMRS General Auction Report 2024

For the second year the Ohio Mennonite Relief Sale was held at the Event Center in Mt. Hope. There seemed to be good fellowship and support again for the sale. While attendance was good, it appeared to be down a little from the prior year.

My Coins Count was again the leading segment of the sale as it brought in a little over 50% of the proceeds that can be sent to MCC. It was a little lower than last year by approximately \$40,000. Twenty-one churches contributed to this fund.

We've tried to get a variety of items for the sale. Furniture shops/stores have always been one of the businesses that we call on. Outdoor furniture has become a popular item. We started to trend more to restaurants, lodging, entertainment, tools, health, gift shops, foodstuffs, experiences, etc.

HRM Enterprises was very generous in donating many useful tools and home accessories. They also were instrumental in the picking up of products with the use of their trucks and manpower. Other companies gave reduced prices on items and tools that sell well at this auction. Of the companies called on, about half gave items/products and about half gave gift cards.

Leroy Yoder was again very gracious to allow the sale items to be stored in his garage until close to the sale date.

2024 Sponsorship report

For 2024 we received \$34,000 in sponsorships to cover building rental and other expenses associated with the auction. Big thanks to Mike Palmer and Kami Sommers for helping secure these funds. We are working on a new marketing piece to help in expanding this revenue stream allowing for contributions for people that can't contribute goods or services for the auction.

OMRS Gift Card Silent Auction Report -- 2024 -

We had 4 boards (5' x 10' - 13 Columns wide and 6 Rows high) with 312 sections to display sale items and room to write bidder number and their bid. We used 225 of these sections.

We did not have business logos in the squares this year. We had a little more descriptive info of the business instead. (Will assess how that played out). We spread out multiple gift cards from the same business to each of the 4 boards and also combined some to have higher value gift cards. (Example: A business gives 10 - \$100 cards, we maybe had a \$100, a \$200, a \$300, and a \$400 square to equal the \$1,000 total).

We had one worker per board for a two-hour shift with another helper for the last 1/2 hour before that board closed. One board closed Friday at 7:30 p.m. The other three boards closed Saturday at 11:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m. and at 1:30 p.m.

Closing prices and winning bidder numbers were then given to cashiers to enter the info to sale buyers accounts. All in all, prices went similarly to other years.

Report from the 2024 MCC Run 4 Relief --

The emphasis of the 2024 Ohio MCC Run 4 Relief was raising money to assist Mennonite Central Committee in purchasing local goats for families in Lebanon and Africa. Working with local agricultural cooperatives, the families can use goats' milk and cheese to increase their income. This income can be used to buy a wider variety of foods, new clothing and to assist in sending family members to school.

Saturday morning, July 13 started out with a short rain shower then turned sunny. Tents were hoisted and tables were set up. The route was the same as last year and wound through family farms and past an Amish School. The East Holmes Fire District personnel were asked to block the roads from traffic to safeguard the runners.

The run had a total of **13 1K** runners and **80 5K** runners. At 7:30 the 1K Run started. There was one entrant in the "runner-pushing stroller" category. After the 1K runners and walkers crossed the finish line, they enjoyed bananas, oranges, water and Gatorade at the tent.

The 5K runners lined up and took off at 8:00 AM. The 5 K participants ranged in age from 8 to 81 years. The runners spaced themselves and enjoyed the beautiful morning sun and mild breezes. After the run, many runners asked if the hills could be flattened to make the course easier.

First place winners in the Ladies Division: Carolyn Miller, Elsa Henico, and Olivia Wenger. The



winners in the <u>Men's Division</u>: Amos Bixler, Jacob Miller and Derrick Miller.

Carolyn, Amos and Jacob were repeat winners from last year. Our final tally for goats was **58** goats to be purchased for MCC.

Book Sales

During the auction we only had a few browsers and the last hour and a half of the sale we sold no books. The designated area for book sales seem to work well. There was a lot of foot traffic past us. I believe it aided the selling as people would browse and then return to buy as they were leaving the building.

Some people said they would prefer an actual price on the books, but seem to be fine when we explain that it was a free will donation. Children's books did not sell as well as those that were geared towards adults and teenagers.

If the Relief Board choose to move forward next year with the selling of books it might be beneficial to have a few free-standing bookshelves. They might aid in separating the books by genre or age appropriate materials. If memory serves the 2-day total was \$900 + Which was a 100% profit as we purchased no books for the sale, all books were donated for resale.

2024 Relief Sale Signage Report

Approximately 40 rectangular green signs were used this year at the Mt. Hope Event Center. It took most of Thursday (7 hr) and some on Friday (3 hr) to put them in place, and about 3 hrs to collect and palletize them Saturday afternoon. Two others helped for about an hour during the collection. Six banners of MCC scenes were also deployed during this time. They came from MCC Connections. The green signs are being stored on a pallet in the Gerber Building, along with at least an equal number of unused signs of several varieties, and a bin of hanging supplies.

Most of the signs were hung using the Event Center's poles, bases, and cross beams. They were attached with wire and/or string and metal hooks that belong to the Relief Sale. Tools used were wire cutters, pliers, ladder, and a knife.

The signs are generally in good condition, some are showing some age. The one station that did not have a sign was the Coffee. This should be added for next year if it will be done again. A new one can be made, but the material is quite expensive. Perhaps one of the unused ones can be repurposed. Any other new signage should be requested in the Spring of next year.

I can tentatively plan to do this next year, but will be changing employment and don't know if I will be able to take the time off for it or not. Budget for this year was \$0.

TROLLEY DISPERSAL REPORT

Prior to the Ohio Mennonite Relief Sale (OMRS) relocating to the Event Center at Mt. Hope in 2023, the auctions were held in tents and various buildings in Wayne County. Parking lots to accommodate the attendees were often a distance from the auction. To facilitate their walking to the auction, hay wagons were used initially and later then, three trolleys pulled by tractors were constructed to transport visitors to and from the auction site.

After moving to Mt. Hope, a large parking lot located close to the west end of the Event Center enabled the buyers to more readily walk to and from the building. For elderly buyers, it became obvious that golf carts were a more efficient means of providing transportation.

After some deliberation, the OMRS board decided to sell the three trolleys. Although the Amish community used the trolleys regularly, in selling the trolleys to them, the trolley weight was significant *and* was not an option to be pulled by horses. A local Amish business agreed to sell the trolleys for us, and successfully found buyers for the wagons in Oregon, Wooster, and Middlefield. OMRS netted an average of \$6,000 for each wagon.

But there is a memorable story behind these trolleys. For years Roland Geiser, his son Andrew, and numerous other helpers would wave flags as sale goers arrived in their vehicles, directing them to rows in the parking lot. Regrettably, both Roland and thirteen-year-old Andrew were on a plane that tragically crashed a short distance north of Preferred Airparts. The plane burst into flames. Andrew, along with three other men, were killed. Roland was severely burned as he relentlessly attempted to pull Andrew out of the plane.

Shortly thereafter, OMRS decided to purchase a red trolley to facilitate easy transportation for attendees to the auction and back to their vehicles. In memory of Andrew, Roland, along with eight to twelve local men, decided to build two more wagons. There was a remembrance placard attached to the red trolley. The placard was removed from the trolley and given to Andrew's mother, Karen Geiser.

2024 MCC Report to Ohio Mennonite Relief Sale

We are grateful for the dedication and hard work of so many people who make the Ohio Mennonite Relief Sale possible.

MCC booth

Sarah Doerksen, material resources coordinator, managed the MCC booth at the sale. She was joined by Danae King, donor relations associate, and Jennifer Steiner, communications director, who are both based here in northeast Ohio.

The placement of our MCC booth this year seemed to work well for traffic flow. We used several new large free-standing banners with MCC photos to serve as dividers to define the space and to highlight MCC's work around the world. We also placed posters with QR codes around the building and provided handouts with MCC information when people checked out.

Visitors to our booth enjoyed spinning the prize wheel, and we had special gifts for MCC alumni. We also had a television screen showing photos of the progress of the new Material Resources Center under construction in Kidron, along with building plans and other information about the building project. Examples of MCC kits and comforters were displayed and led to some good conversations and connections.

On Friday evening, Sarah shared stories from her recent visit to Zambia highlighting the work of MCC partners in the area. Danae opened the auction on Saturday morning with a prayer of blessing and thanks from MCC.

Hygiene kit packing

Sarah coordinated a hygiene kit packing event for children following the completion of the children's auction. The children packed 250 kits that will provide important items to other children and families around the world.

MCC at work around the world

Thanks to your support, MCC is working in 45 countries around the world. You're helping families in India access clean water closer to their homes. In Mexico, you're helping farmers learn new agricultural techniques to improve their food security. And in Kentucky and West Virginia, you're helping homeowners get safe, warm and try homes through the Appalachia Build program.

Food Coordinator Annual Report

The second year in the new space was another big success for the food vendors. This year we made the decision to make a donation to Bethany Church's Youth Group, in exchange for youth to set-up on Thursday and Friday, and to clean-up, trash pick-up, and manage the refreshment stand on Friday night and Saturday. A huge thank you to the youth and all the other people who helped set up, clean up, prepare, and serve our great food selections.

Following were the food tables available in 2024:

- Chicken Dinner: We ordered the same weight of chicken served in 2023, but the number of pieces was significantly increased, due to slightly smaller individual pieces. Therefore, we had several coolers of chicken to sell individually at the end of the sale. Members of the Amish community made the noodles and served the food on Friday night. An Amish wedding on the same day interfered with the Amish volunteer availability on Saturday; we hope that help is available again in 2025. The chicken griller was again Paul Miller.
- Breakfast: This meal was again well organized and managed by Mark Stutzman, who
 coordinated the many volunteers and cooks necessary. Mark reports that the number of
 breakfasts served was slightly down this year, and the second serving line was never really
 needed.
- **Eggrolls:** Pam Blough and Ruby Witmer, both from Hartville, organized the eggroll preparation and serving his year, with great success. The eggrolls were prepared and rolled on Wednesday and Thursday at the Hartville Kitchen, then transported to the sale on Friday morning. Approximately 7,000 eggrolls were made; this year there was improvement in the construction of the eggrolls, so we actually had more than we did last year and will likely do slightly fewer next year.
- Oak Grove Church; Fresh fruit, and veggie burgers: Gloria Miller coordinated this stand, which again included delicious fresh corn along with the fresh fruit and veggie burgers.
- Sausage and Bratwurst Sandwiches: This stand was smoothly managed by Matt Yoder and Reuben Erb.
- Pie and Ice Cream: Steve and Elaine Lehman and Dean and Prudy Steiner ran the Pie and Ice Cream stand. They increased the number of pies this year and served well into the day on Saturday.
- Ice Cream: Leroy and Carol Yoder and their family managed the ice cream stand and also made arrangements for the ice that was needed by his stand as well as the refreshment stand. The ice cream was a big hit, whether it was eaten plain, with chocolate or butterscotch toppings, or with a delicious slice of pie.
- **Smoothies:** Brad and Diana Boyd managed the smoothie stand, making the smoothies in the Event Center kitchen, and served at a table nearby. This set-up worked well, allowing for the easy mixing and distribution of the smoothies.
- **Refreshment Stand:** We did not have lemonade this year, so we sold completely out of all soft drinks, with extra brought in on Saturday.
- **Swiss Pantry:** Janet Shoup and Leona Horst managed the 2024 Swiss Pantry. They have been faithful coordinators of this stand for many years, and both are ready to pass it on to others. Unfortunately, if we do not secure other coordinators for this stand, we will not be able to host a Swiss Pantry next year.

- Fun Food: This was the second year for this stand, serving cotton candy, popcorn, and Snocones. The Sno Cones were not a big hit likely because of the in-door, air-conditioned setting, and the fact that we also have a Smoothie stand. Otherwise, the fun foods provide a nice snack option for both Friday night and Saturday. Members of Pittsburgh Mennonite Church manage this stand.
- **Specialty Coffees:** Lyn and Pam Nisly, owners of Hartville's Front Porch Café, provided this welcomed stand, offering both iced and hot specialty coffees. It appears that the income from this stand was included in the Smoothie's stand; in future years, we will split the stands out to keep a more accurate accounting of the individual stands.

CONSTITUTION OHIO MENNONITE RELIEF SALE, INC.

Article I

This organization shall be known as the Ohio Mennonite Relief Sale, Inc.

Article 2

The purpose of this organization shall be to plan, organize, and supervise an annual relief sale and auction for MCC (Mennonite Central Committee).

Article 3

The Ohio Mennonite Relief Sale, Inc. shall represent all congregations in Ohio and Western Pennsylvania who support MCC. The committee will be chosen from three area groups: Wayne-Medina and Western Ohio; Stark, Northeastern Ohio and Western Pennsylvania; and Holmes, Tuscarawas, and Southern Ohio.

- A. Each affiliated congregation is encouraged to select a representative:
 - 1. This representative should attend the General Meeting scheduled to wrap up the fiscal year.
 - 2. This representative should carry relief sale information to his/her congregation and channel the participation of his/her congregation in the relief safe.
 - 3. Ministers and lay members may attend the general meeting and have voting power.

Article 4

Executive Board

- A. The Executive Board-shall consist of twelve members affirmed at the General Meetings and past chairperson serving in an advisory capacity. Each year four members shall be affirmed to serve a three-year term. From the Wayne, Stark and Holmes/Tuscarawas County areas, two members will be chosen. The other two members may be at-large representatives from any area, either in Ohio or Western Pennsylvania. Neither male nor female members may compose more than two-thirds of the Board.
- B. After expiration of the first three-year term, the board member has the option of allowing his/her name to be put on the ballot for a second three-year term. The board member would be eligible to serve for six consecutive years before a required leave of absence from the Board.
- C. Representative pastors or individuals are welcome to attend an Executive Board session with advance notice to the chairperson.

Officers

- A. The Executive Board shall organize from its group, electing a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and secretary to serve a term of one year.
- B. The treasurer will be appointed yearly by the Executive Board. The office can be filled from the Executive Board or outside of the Board.

Committees

- A. All members of the Executive Board may submit nominations of new board members for discussion and approval. The new four Board members are to be affirmed at the annual General Meeting.
- B. All committees and groups associated with the Ohio Mennonite Relief Sale will be responsible to the Executive Board.
- C. The Executive Board may appoint or accept additional committees as needed.

Article 5

Membership Meetings

- A. An annual General Meeting of Ohio Mennonite Relief Sale, Inc. for MCC shall be held each year within 30 days after the close of the fiscal year, at which time the business shall include:
 - 1. Report of the Sale
 - 2. Affirmation of Executive Board members
 - 3. Other business brought by Executive Board members
- B. Sectional meetings shall be planned for sale promotion.
- C. Additional meetings may be called at the discretion of the Executive Board.

Article 6

After the constitution has been accepted, changes can be made at any annual meeting by two-thirds majority vote of eligible representatives present providing such proposed changes are brought to the attention of the Executive Board at least two weeks before the Annual Meeting.

Board members shall be chosen from the same area they represent, with neither male nor female members composing more than two-thirds of the Board. (see Meeting Minutes dated October 2011)

October 1999

Article 4, paragraph A. was:

The Executive Board-shall consist of **nine** members affirmed at the annual meetings and past president serving in an advisory capacity. Each year **three** members shall be affirmed to serve a three-year term. Board members shall be chosen from the same area they represent, with neither male nor female members composing more than two-thirds of the Board. (see Meeting Minutes dated October 1999)

Article 4, Committee, paragraph A. was:

The persons serving their second year on the Board shall be the Nominating Committee and will present the names of **three** Board members to be affirmed at the annual meeting.
